

2023 Message from Black Women for Positive Change

Dear Black Women for Positive Change Networkers,

It was with distress—and hope, that we implemented the October 2023 12th Annual Month of Non-Violence, Families, Voters Rights and Opportunities. The epidemic of violence in the world, is frightening to us all and our global network believes we must “*Change the Culture of Violence in America, and the World.*”

During October and early November, we hosted a combination of 83 Peace Circles, workshops, and classroom activities, in 14 USA States and 8 nations. Over 3,500 participants from diverse backgrounds, religions, and nations attended the activities which addressed school violence, school safety, bullying, domestic violence, gun control and the impact of artificial intelligence on society. Now, our challenge is to find resources so we can measure the impact of our programs and expand Peace Circles to 50 States, and dozens of countries. Also, included in this Report on page 11, is a listing of podcasts of some of the events. We encourage you to view and listen to the presentations.

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SECTION I

REPORT SUMMARY

The violence prevention initiative established by Black Women for Positive Change, began in 2012, with the first “Day of Non-Violence.” A day-long event was held at Metropolitan AME Church in Washington, D.C. Following that year, the “Day of Non-Violence” expanded to a “Week of Non-Violence and in October 2023 became the 12th Annual “Month of Non-Violence, Families, Voters Rights and Opportunities.”

During October 2023, there were 83 Peace Circles and virtual and face-to-face events in 16 USA States, and 8 countries. Over 3,551 adults, youth and children participated in events that focused on conflict resolution, anger management, de-escalation of violence, artificial intelligence and “opportunities as alternatives to violence.”

This report provides a summary of the events and Peace Circles that took place during the 12th Annual Month of Non-Violence, Families, Voters Rights and Opportunities. We hope readers will join this effort, so in 2024 can be expanded worldwide.

2023 FOCUS—RESTORATIVE JUSTICE PEACE CIRCLES

During the Month of Non-Violence in October 2023, the network of organizers reached out to schools and educational institutions to encourage “Restorative Justice Peace Circles.” The goal was to teach youth and adults how to change their personal, family, and community cultures, so that violence can be avoided. We had an excellent response and extend our thanks to the teachers and students.

Peace Circle Co-Chairs were Professor Renata Valree, Director, Peace in Education and Professor, California State University at Dominguez Hills, California; and Kimberly Best, CEO of Best Conflict Solutions LLC, in Tennessee. At the outset of the Month of Non-Violence Dr. Valree and Ms. Best commented, “We are aware that Educators use effective Peace Circles in many cities and states. We invite school superintendents, principals, and teachers to expand this effort by organizing Peace Circles at their schools.” Schools and organizations in Pennsylvania, Washington, D.C., Ivory Coast and Nigeria, responded by organizing Peace Circles and teaching children how to build relationships, relax and express themselves honestly and peacefully.

10 Commandments for Conflict Resolution

Commandment 1: Conflict is a reality. There is no escaping the fact. Hiding won't solve anything.

Commandment 2: You can't wish the problem away. Don't pretend to put on a mask. Keeping your feelings cooped inside won't work.

Commandment 3: Learn to deal with the problem, not the person. Conflict occurs because of a particular issue, not because of a person. Don't make it personal.

Commandment 4: Be respectful. Listen to the other person. Really listen. Listening to your parents or teachers may seem like a drag but zoning out is not the solution.

Commandment 5: Be assertive. You don't need to be either passive or aggressive to deal with teen conflicts. You need to be assertive. Being, assertive means putting your views forward confidently and calmly.

Commandment 6: Learn to negotiate. This is the most important skill you need to learn. Negotiating is a skill that will serve you in the long term.

Commandment 7: Stick to the present. Don't drag in past issues. Doing so will only muddy the conflict further.

Commandment 8: The silent treatment does not work. Sulking is as bad as getting aggressive - it won't solve the problem. Talk it out.

Commandment 9: Be understanding. Try to put yourself in the other person's shoes. Don't get defensive and analyze the situation.

Commandment 10: Learn to say sorry. Stand in front of the mirror and practice if need be! If you are wrong, accept it. Doing so will not make you a wimp. Only a strong person has the strength to say "sorry". This simple word can be like magic, try it!

Peace In Education (PiE) held a Law Enforcement-Community Dialogue on the topic of “Existing of Deputy Gangs and Gang Subculture”, with the Los Angeles County Sheriff’s Department.” Attended by 80 individuals, there was standing room only. Attendance included representatives from law enforcement, civic leaders, educators, community-based organizations, faith-based leaders, youth, young adults, families, and oversight organizations.

The dialog allowed for open and honest discussion in the form of a Peace Circle and key points made were:

- An L.A. County Deputy acknowledged historical harm and accepted responsibility for it.
- Desire for Emotional Intelligence training, particularly in the areas of community, trauma, and trauma-informed approaches.
- Importance of understanding, empathy, and practical skills to ensure the safety of deputies and community members.
- Mutual recognition, respect, and appreciation between the law enforcement officers in attendance and community members with understanding that meaningful change can only occur through communication, active listening, and open-mindedness.
- Recognition from the community and law enforcement that they cannot achieve change without each other. The voices of youth were valued and emphasized, and the training highlighted the perspectives and insights of the youth.







The effort to expand Restorative Peace Circles, is organized by **Black Women for Positive Change**, (BW4PC) along with Good Brothers, Millennials and GenZs.



“During the Month of Non-Violence in October 2023, we are reaching out to schools and educational institutions to organize “Restorative Justice Peace Circles.” We must teach youth and adults how to change their personal, family and community cultures, so violence can be avoided,” stated Dr. Stephanie Myers and Honorable Daun S. Hester, National Co-Chairs, Black Women for Positive Change. The Co-Chairs continued, “We have worked for twelve years with government leaders, civic leaders, faith leaders, educators, and the business sector, to put a priority on violence prevention and to promote de-escalation of violence. We, the people of all backgrounds, races and religions, must find ways to stop the growing epidemic of mass shootings and individual violence.”

The Peace Circles Committee is led by Professor Renata Valree, of Peace in Education, in California, and Kimberly Best, CEO, Best Conflict Solutions LLC, in Tennessee. Dr. Valree and Ms. Best stated, “We are aware that effective Peace Circles are used by Educators in many cities and states. We invite school superintendents, principals, and teachers to expand this effort by organizing Peace Circles at their schools. School districts and educators can sign up at www.monthofnonviolence.org. Individuals and groups who sign up will receive free Peace Circles Tool Kits. We will also connect those interested in receiving advance training through a National Association for Community Mediation, local community mediation center.” Co-sponsors of the 12th Annual Month of Non-Violence, Families, Voters Rights and Opportunities, and the Peace Circles initiative are National Black Nurses Association, Peace in Education, Best Conflict Solutions, National Association for Community Mediation, 100 Fathers Inc., Everytown for Gun Safety, Trusted Inc., Preeclampsia Foundation and Positive Change Foundation.

PREECLAMPSIA FOUNDATION TEAMS WITH BLACK WOMEN FOR POSITIVE CHANGE TO ADDRESS SELF-ADVOCACY IN BLACK MATERNAL HEALTH, NONVIOLENCE

Two national nonprofit organizations known for their advocacy work for women and families are partnering to address disparities in Black maternal health and provide solutions to close the gap.

The Preeclampsia Foundation and Black Women for Positive Change are co-hosting the live Zoom event, “Changing the Narrative: Examining Black Maternal Health through the Lens of Advocacy and Non-Violence,” at 6:30 p.m. Thursday, Oct. 19, in recognition of October as the Month of Non-Violence, Families, Voters Rights, and Opportunities. The free webinar includes invited healthcare providers, community leaders, patient advocates, and other experts discussing strategies to help ensure more Black mothers and babies survive childbirth and the postpartum period. Registration is available via [Zoom](#).

“This discussion is urgently needed when we consider the alarming statistics on maternal morbidity in the U.S. that disproportionately affects Black women,” says Dr. Stephanie E. Myers, PhD, national co-chair of Black Women for Positive Change. The organization is a multicultural advocacy network dedicated to “changing the culture of violence” by promoting awareness of de-escalation tools and methods, supporting de-escalation legislation on state and federal levels, and the main sponsor of annual Months of Non-Violence. “By arming pregnant persons and their families with knowledge and steps on how they can advocate for themselves in maternal health spaces, we are helping to curtail potential conflict in emergency situations,” Myers adds.

Featured speakers for the event include leaders from the Black Women for Positive Change and the Preeclampsia Foundation; Connie Graves, MD, MFM, Medical Director of Tennessee Maternal Fetal Medicine; Porsche Holland-Otunba, M.S., CLC, C-CBE of Reclaim Black Motherhood; Alexis Dunn Amore, PhD, CNM, FACNM, NYU Professor, Choices Center for Reproductive Health; Carthenia Jefferson, Esq., RN, Chair of the National Black Nurses Association; Valda Crowder, MD of University of Pittsburgh Medical Center; Patient and Family advocates Shakima Tozay, LICSW, PMH-C and Wanda Irving of Dr. Shalon’s Maternal Action Project; Sheridan Blackwell, MHA, Head of Systems Change, Partnerships and Hospitals of the IRTH app.

According to the latest report by the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, Black women are nearly three times more likely to die during childbirth than women of other races and ethnicities. In addition, Black women are 60% more likely to develop preeclampsia, a life-threatening hypertensive disorder of pregnancy, with statistically worse outcomes, including being three times more likely to die from complications. “Like Black Women for Positive Change, the Preeclampsia Foundation focuses on solutions, not restating the problem,” said Preeclampsia Foundation Director

of Communications and Engagement Laney Poye. “We take an evidence-based, multi-level approach that includes national, local, and individual action to address preeclampsia and its impact on Black women and birthing people.”

“That is why the webinar on Oct. 19 is so important. We have assembled a panel of speakers who will bring different perspectives on Black Maternal Health to the discussion that adds to real, actionable ways we can transform care and improve outcomes,” Poye said. The Preeclampsia Foundation is currently amplifying the voices of Black moms and their birth experiences in research on the disorder through its Take 10 for Preeclampsia Research campaign. The initiative urges women to take 10 minutes to sign up for the Preeclampsia Registry and add their pregnancy experience to preeclampsia research efforts. 
